

## **Serving Washington Students**



- 84.3% of undergrads are Washington residents
- 108,795 undergraduate students
- 25,821 graduate and professional students



- 4 branch campuses UW Bothell, UW Tacoma, WSU Tri-Cities, WSU Vancouver
- WSU North Puget Sound at Everett and six Everett University Center partners
- WSU Spokane/EWU Spokane
- University centers and academic partnerships with 21 community and technical colleges
- One third of undergraduates are low income
- 36% of entering students are transferring from another institution




## **Undergraduate Student Profile (2014-2015)**

• 37% of degrees awarded in STEM/High Demand areas






## **Graduate Student Profile (2014-15)**

46% of degrees awarded in STEM/High Demand areas







### Washington's Community and Technical College Transfer Students

- In 2014-15, 36% of entering undergraduates to the public baccalaureates were transfer students.
- More than 76% of Washington community and technical college students who transferred in 2013-14 matriculated into one of Washington's public baccalaureates.






# Race/ethnicity of Washington community & technical college transfer students (2014)





## **Tuition & State Funding History Over Time**








## **Transfer Students Progress and Completion**

- In Washington transfer students graduate with a bachelor's degree with a similar number of total credits as those who start at a four-year institution as a freshman. This not true nationally.
- Washington students transfer with an associate degree and earn bachelor's degrees at much higher rates than students nationally.
- Transfer students earned **40%** of all bachelor's degrees at Washington public colleges and universities, including:
  - **47%** of business graduates
  - **46%** of health field graduates
  - **35%** of STEM major graduates










# **Low College Participation**


- In 2012 Washington ranked **47**<sup>th</sup> in the nation for participation in college by age 19 (**36.7**%). National average is **46.8**%
- 30 years ago WA ranked 8<sup>th</sup> nationally (30.9%).
- Top ranked states: ND (61.8%), Iowa (61.7%), MN (60.6%), MA (58.7%).
  - 74.5% high school graduation rate
  - X 49.2% college continuation rate
  - = 36.7% college participation by age 19








# U.S. College Continuation Rates by Income for 18-24 High School Graduates (2014)





# Washington Ranks 47<sup>th</sup> in Participation in 4-year Public Higher Education at the Undergraduate Level


Public undergraduate 4-year participation rates based on the population age 20-34, 2011-12.






# Washington Ranks 47<sup>th</sup> In Participation In Public Graduate Education

Public graduate participation rates based on the population age 20-34, 2011-12.






# Washington Ranks **40**<sup>th</sup> In Public Bachelor's Degrees Produced Per 1,000 Population Aged 20 To 34
