



2019 Legislative Session Outreach Strategies and Resources for Board Members (part adapted from WSSDA doc)

Active engagement with legislators and other education partners is critical throughout the year. State Board of Education members are uniquely positioned to establish relationships and educate current and prospective legislators about education issues, priorities, and Legislative Session pressure points. This document suggests steps to take in building relationships leading into the session and provides important web links/resources for staying connected.

Outreach and Relationship Building

- **Familiarize yourself with SBE's 2019 Legislative Platform and Strategic Plan.** Develop shared messages and communication materials to use about SBE's priorities. Collaborate with partner agency and organizations to the fullest extent possible.
- <u>Build and nurture relationships.</u> Reach out to each of your three legislators (everyone has one Senator and two Representatives), as well as other key legislators in caucus leadership positions and on education and fiscal committees. During the interim, take them to coffee and/or invite them to a Board meeting.
- <u>Gather and share information data and facts.</u> Help legislators understand the issues embedded in SBE's legislative platform and strategic plan. Make suggestions about what the Legislature can do to help alleviate challenges.

SBE 2019 Legislative Session Protocol

SBE's 2019 Legislative Platform, Strategic Plan, and Statutorily-Designated Duties will direct our legislative advocacy protocols.

Specific protocols Board members can expect:

- 1. Staff will check daily introductions.
- 2. Staff will determine whether to track bills as priorities or monitoring based on whether they impact SBE's work, legislative platform or strategic plans.
- 3. Staff will analyze all bills designated as priorities.
- 4. Staff (Randy Spaulding and Kaaren Heikes) will determine what actions, if any, SBE will take on specific bills. In any instance in which SBE's statutory duties, strategic plan or 2019 legislative platform do not give clear direction as to SBE's position or potential actions, Randy and Kaaren will reach out to Kevin, and if needed, discuss with the Executive Committee (even possibly scheduling a call outside of the regular biweekly meetings).
- 5. Staff will send a weekly legislative update to the full Board which includes the Bill Tracking Matrix, as well as hearings on priority bills for the upcoming week; staff will begin including a Bill Status document, as well, once relevant (i.e., after the first policy cut-off in mid-February).
- 6. Other updates on staff and Board testimony and other topics as needed will be sent out on Fridays with the Bill Tracking Matrix.
- 7. The Executive Committee will discuss bills of priority to SBE during its biweekly calls.
